#### A message from the Rector

Dear Friends in Christ,

I have said these things to you so that my joy may be in you and your joy may be complete. (John 15:1-11).

Jesus spoke these words about the gift of joy at a difficult and troubled time. In fact, he said this to the disciples on the night of his last supper with them, when he knew that his arrest, betrayal, and death were imminent. Why did Jesus speak of joy on such a dark night and sorrowful occasion? And how can we receive the gift of joy that Jesus offers – indeed promises – in our own difficult and troubled times, and in a world filled with sorrow and suffering?

During the months of February and March, as we finish the season of Epiphany and move into Lent, St. John's will be reading together *The Book of Joy*. I invite you to read along and join in the group discussions and explorations as you are able, either in person on Sunday mornings or via Zoom on Thursday evenings.

The Book of Joy is the record of some remarkable and candid conversations between Archbishop Desmond Mpilo Tutu and the Dalai Lama, spiritual leader of Tibetan Buddhism. Archbishop Tutu led the fight against Apartheid and the crusade for racial reconciliation in South Africa and was an activist for justice and reconciliation around the world. The Dalai Lama has been living in exile in India since 1959 following the Tibetan Uprising against Chinese rule. Both Desmond Tutu and the Dalai Lama led their people in dark and troubled times. Both are recipients of the Nobel Peace Prize. Both are also known for their giggles and their joyful personalities and they have been friends for a long time.

These two spiritual leaders, men of prayer and activism, discuss the importance of cultivating joy, the obstacles to joy, and the prayer and practices that increase our awareness and capacity for joy.

While we continue to struggle and suffer through this pandemic as a church and as a city and nation, I believe that joy is also infectious and essential for healing. When have you discovered joy? How will we learn to cultivate joy as a people despite the obstacles and difficulties that stand in the way? Let us learn together – in conversation with each other, with Jesus, and from two spiritual leaders of our own time.

#### Special Events on Sunday, February 27

February 27 is the last Sunday of the Season of Epiphany. Three special events are planned to mark the end of Epiphany and help us make the transition to the more somber season of Lent.

#### Mardi Gras Coffee Hour February 27

Though Mardi Gras (aka "Fat Tuesday") is March 1, we're getting a head start on it this year following the 10:30 service on February 27. Join us for a festive coffee hour replete with beads, masks, and special foods!

Origin: Medieval Christians developed carnivals to celebrate with exuberance one last time before the rigorous Lenten fast. Although Lenten regulations varied with time and place, no meat, butter, eggs, milk or cheese were generally allowed during the 40 days of Lent. In addition to fasting, Christians were not permitted to hold weddings, dances, or festivals during Lent, the season for prayer and penance. So medieval Christians began to observe days of celebration, to hold rowdy parades, masquerades, and dances, and to fling themselves into festivities one last time before Lent.

#### Saying Good-bye to "Alleluia"

The Church has the custom of not speaking or singing the word "Alleluia" during Lent. Alleluias are joyful proclamations, which we put away during the more contemplative season of Lent. Churches often take banners down and eliminate flowers in the sanctuary. Our Sunday readings and prayers take on a more penitential tone.

On the last Sunday of the Epiphany season, February 27, after the 10:30 service, we will process out the front garden and "bury" the Alleluia until Easter. Join us! (On Easter, there will be a great celebration as our "Alleluia" is unburied and brought back into our nave and into our prayer, worship, and songs.)

#### Burning of the Palms for Ash Wednesday

Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent. The focal point of Ash Wednesday is the imposition of ashes on our foreheads in the sign of the cross. The ashes symbolize repentance, and also remind us of both our creation and mortality: "you are dust and to dust you shall return. The sign of the cross on our foreheads reminds us of our baptism; in both life and death we are "marked as Christ's own forever."

The ashes are made each year by burning the palms from the previous Palm Sunday celebration. On the last Sunday of Epiphany we will also burn the palms to prepare for our Ash Wednesday services.

#### "Hotel Amenities and More"



The need in the homeless population and the working poor is great. To serve the needs of our neighbors, we continue to collect donations of coats, warm hats and scarves, gloves, chemical hand warmers, men's and women's clothing, shoes, boots, rain gear, blankets, backpacks, sleeping bags, tarps, tents, shower gel, shampoo and conditioner, deodorant, razors, lotion, feminine

hygiene products, lip balm, tissue packets, cough drops, laundry detergent, bleach, bottled water, snacks, coffee, and...hotel amenities!

We also collect donations for Family Promise. Some items go directly to families that are being served by Familiy Promise, while other items are sold in the Family Promise re-sale store. Proceeds from the store go to help homeless families get back on their feet. Anything that you might generally donate to Goodwill or the Salvation Army can be donated to Family Promise.

Upcoming drop-off dates are Feb 19, March 19, and April 23. All are Saturdays at Noon - 1:15 pm. (Enter from Myrtle Street and turn in to the driveway that connects with Fairview Street. Friendly volunteers will greet you at the side door to the church and will collect your donations. You don't even need to get out of your car!)

You have heard that St. John's is collecting feminine hygiene products for the Girl Scout Caring Cabinet that we sponsor. That is in addition to the feminine hygiene products that we collect for the agencies such as the Johnson City Day Center, and they are two separate projects. Please be generous in your giving to both of St. John's ministries that support womens' needs.

Thank you for your faithful ministry to those around us who have so little and for whom your care and concern means so much.

#### Caring Cabinet

In partnership with a local Girl Scout Troop, St. John's installed a Caring Cabinet on the Fairview Street side of the building in 2021. St. John's as a community committed to keeping the cabinet stocked with feminine hygiene supplies and other personal care items for those in our neighborhood in need. As we make the stocking of this cabinet more

formally organized, we hope to keep the necessary items more available.

There are several ways you can assist with this effort:

- Sign up to stock the cabinet for a given week. There is a sign-up sheet in the Narthex to volunteer for this. You will be placing items in the cabinet that many have contributed.
- Purchase feminine hygiene items for a week. A sheet with a list of ideas for other items is posted on the basket near the sign-up sheet in the narthex.

#### Conversations & Compline - Special Edition - February 3: Circle of the Church Year: Seasons of the Spirit



#### Inquirers' Class ~ Reborn, Renewed, Received

The Rt. Rev. Brian Cole, Bishop of the Diocese of East Tennessee will visit St. John's on Sunday, June 19. As part of his visit, the Bishop will perform the pastoral rites of Confirmation, Reception, and Reaffirmation

Prior to the Bishop's visit, St. John's will offer a series of classes to present, explain, and discuss the Episcopal Church, Christian doctrine, history, and worship. We call this program the "Inquirers' Class: Reborn, Renewed, Received." This program is intended for adults who would like to be confirmed, received into the Episcopal Church, or to reaffirm their Baptismal vows. It is also open to those who simplywant to learn more about the Church and our faith.

The 2022 Inquirers' Class will meet in 10 weekly sessions, 6:00 p.m. to 7:15 pm, on Sundays from March 13 through May 29 (excluding Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday). Leaders for the classes will include Rev. Laura Bryant, Deacon Cathy Johnston, Dr. John Nash, and Dr. Fred Mackara. We finished the calendar year with Net Income of \$32,851. - (See second column at left.) It should be noted that these are unaudited results; the annual audit of our church financials are conducted by an outside CPA firm each spring.

Earlier we reported that we would prepay certain expenses for 2022. To that end we used

\$34,000+ from our surplus income to prepay a portion of our 2022 Diocesan Commitment, and we put \$12,000 into our Capital Maintenance Reserve. We enter 2022 with a balanced budget that provides for new hope, new missions, and new ministries.
