A message from the Rector

The Fullness of Life

When people ask me, "How are you?" or "How are you doing," I often simply say "Life is full!" This seems like the best and only answer I can give. Life is full. Life in the church, in this beloved community, is full. My days are full, long, but still too short. My mind is full – of plans and projects, good ideas and bad ones, confusions and clarities. My heart is full – of wonder and sorrow, loves and passions, anxieties and worries, gratitude and frustration, and many hopes and dreams.

My prayers are full. How could they not be?

Full. Life is full. Yours is too.

On Easter Day and throughout the Easter season, we prayed the Eucharistic Prayer D, which includes this beautiful line near the beginning: Fountain of life and source of all goodness, you made all things and fill them with your blessing; you created them to rejoice in the splendor of your radiance. Life is full because God fills us, at our creation and each day ever after, with God's love and blessing.

On Pentecost Sunday we learned that the Holy Spirit filled the whole house where the disciples were gathered, and that all the disciples, each and every one, were filled with the gift of the Holy Spirit. Ever after, as they went out into the world to share the good news, they might have answered, "Life is full." Yours is too, because you have been filled with the gifts of the Spirit.

Later on Paul wrote to the church at Ephesus, "I pray that you may have the power to comprehend, with all the saints, what is the breadth and length and height and depth and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, so that you may be filled with all the fullness of God." And we have been knit together in one body, which is the fullness of him who fills all in all.

Life is full. Because we have been filled, at our creation with God's blessing and love and gifts, and because we have each other and are knit together in the fullness of this body.

Thanks be to God for the fullness of life. Life is full. Because of you. I give thanks every day for this beloved community, for all your gifts, ministries, and prayers, and for the ways in which God is leading and calling us in our life and mission together.

High Country Fresco Pilgrimage

A small band of "pilgrims" from St. John's carpooled to Ashe County, North Carolina on May 6 to visit two churches that harbor Benjamin Long's frescoes. Our day started with a prayer of Thanksgiving before heading out.

Our first stop was a small, unassuming white church at the edge of West Jefferson that might be easy to miss. There are no billboards telling a passerby to "See the Frescoes here!" But step inside the



sanctuary of St. Mary's Episcopal Church, lined with rough-hewn beams and paneled walls, and ... just set awhile. The hushed space seems to naturally quiet the mind and allow the soul to breathe.

The frescoes here were created in 1975. They are colored by minerals in plaster – no paint, yet the colors are deep and vibrant. Somehow the art is humble yet majestic, as is fitting for its subjects: John the Baptist, Mary Great with Child, and The Mystery of Faith.

Our second stop was Holy Trinity Episcopal Church in Glendale Springs, North Carolina, which has a life-sized fresco of The Last Supper. We shared a picnic lunch on the grounds and, later, Eucharist in their memory garden. We headed home with gratitude for the gifts of this day and our fellowship together.

Now is the time to start consulting with your personal finance advisor/s to determine if current or future gifts to the Endowment Fund may be beneficial to you and to St. John's.

Fundamentals: The Endowment Fund is...

- » intended to enable the Parish to fulfill its mission more completely by developing ministries beyond what is possible through our annual operating fund;
- » a "gift that keeps on giving," because only a small portion of the fund balance is spent in any given year;
- » used only for expenses that meet very specific criteria.

As of May 31, 2023, the balance of the Endowment Fund is \$162,873. This includes all contributions and earnings, and it has grown substantially over the last three years. NOTE: St. John's Episcopal Church Endowment Fund is governed by The Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA) which gives clear direction on the investment and spending policies of the fund.

Snapshot of Operating Budget Contact: Reneau Dubberley, Treasurer

Through the first half of the year, we continue to enjoy a healthy operating budget. Income is ahead of budget, expense is lower, and we are in a net positive position. Thanks to each of you, along with our staff, for continuing to make sure we use our treasures wisely.

Finally, as a reminder, the Pipe Organ Fund is still approximately \$140,000 short of our goal. Additional donations will be very much appreciated.
